These are challenging times. The COVID-19 pandemic, racial tensions, climate change, and political turmoil affect psychologists and our clients. Knowing how to work successfully with clients who have diverse opinions as well as clients who represent ethnic, racial, cultural, and gender diverse identities is essential. This workshop will focus on the ethical principles of autonomy, beneficence, nonmaleficence, fidelity, and justice to provide a framework for responding to difficult situations. Dr. Knauss taught courses in ethics at Widener University, Immaculata University, and the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine. She has authored several book chapters and journal articles on ethics, and has taught many continuing education workshops on a variety of ethical issues.
